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PREFACE.

This concluding volume of my husband's work consists of a supplementary list of Bibliographical Abbreviations, Appendices, Addenda, and the Index to the entire six volumes.

Most of the material for the appendices was in a forward state of preparation before my husband's death. Appendix I consists of lists of selected officials of the crown to 1399; it has not been possible to make the lists of local officials so comprehensive as those in the appendices to The Place of the Reign of Edward II in English History, but special circumstances made possible the inclusion of two such lists. Through the kindness of Mr. W. H. Waters, a list of officers of North Wales from 1284 to 1343 was available for checking and supplementing the list collected in the course of the work. Other material was generously supplied by Miss M. Rhys and Mr. D. L. Evans and the list as a whole was put into form by Dr. D. M. Broome. Similarly Dr. Broome completed an existing list of constables of Bordeaux. My warm thanks are due to her for all the work she has done in the preparation of the whole appendix. She has undertaken the heavy and responsible labour of preparing it for press, completing some lists, revising all, supplying the list of treasurers of the Exchequer for Edward III's reign from her unpublished Ph.D. thesis, and marshalling all the lists in order. Grateful acknowledgment is also due to Miss L. B. Dibben, Mr. Hilary Jenkinson, Dr. N. B. Lewis, Dr. Margaret Sharp, and Dr. B. Wilkinson for their help in connection with this appendix.

Professor Tait generously undertook the editing of the second appendix, with assistance from Dr. Broome. He checked all the lists of figures for the King's Wardrobe (pp. 73-101). This involved much labour, especially for the later reigns. Miss Broome performed the same service for the Great Wardrobe (pp. 102-108) and the Privy Wardrobe (p. 109).

The length of the addenda and corrigenda is a consequence of the novelty and difficulty of the subject, especially in its early stages. The list is based mainly on notes made by my husband, whose thanks for a large number of these corrections and suggestions are due to the many

scholars whose help is recorded in the list. Dr. Broome has put together the long list with the utmost care, and has incorporated in it additions and corrections kindly made by herself, Miss Mills and Professor Tait.

In addition to her work on the appendices and addenda Dr. Broome has compiled the supplementary list of abbreviations and has read all the proofs of this volume.

We now come to the heart of the volume, the index. My husband was painfully conscious of the sufferings of scholars who attempted to use the work without this guide. He felt that only the publication of an adequate index could render the book fit to take its place in the world of scholarship. The index was started by Dr. Broome, but because of heavy pressure of work in other parts of the book, she had to abandon it at an early stage, and, at her suggestion, Miss Mabel H. Mills then undertook it. The compilation of an index to so large a work calls not only for infinite patience and care but also for rarer qualitiesskilled experience, historical knowledge, mastery of detail and logical analysis. The index itself testifies how successfully Miss Mills has displayed these qualities, and how excellently she has met not only the needs of the administrative historian but also those of workers in other fields. I should like to express my high appreciation to Miss Mills, and I should like to express also the satisfaction that I know my husband would have felt at this sound and workmanlike completion of his labours.

Special thanks are due to the Manchester University Press for their generous financial help with the index. Mr. H. M. McKechnie, the secretary, has done everything that man could do to smooth the path of all concerned. The endless care and trouble that Dr. Tait, the chairman, has taken in the editing of this volume, are a crowning proof of a friendship of almost forty years.

When my husband eagerly set out over the chartless seas of mediæval English administration, he knew the voyage would be long, but could hardly have foreseen that it would occupy the rest of his life. For more than twenty years he sailed through sunshine and through mist, through winds fair and foul, fixing his position by stars or distant peaks, and at long last with strenuous toil brought his ship to port, just before he died. Now his friends have furled the sails and seen her safely docked. I thank them all.

4. KEEPERS OR CLERKS OF THE GREAT WARDROBE.

The following list of acting heads of the great wardrobe is substantially the list published in E.H.R., xxiv., 504-5, but subsequently discovered details have enabled the list of "buyers" to be made more complete and to be pushed farther back. Although it has been thought best to distinguish between the early officers, who were often laymen, and the purely clerical heads after 1282, it must be remembered that the earlier office shades into the later and that the old titles were still retained. List 1 might easily have been amplified, but only buyers who frequently acted, and who seem important in the growth of the office, have been mentioned. In list 2, the dates of appointment are given whenever they can be found, but it should be noted that the date of appointment was by no means always the date on which the keeper began to act. Usually the nominee did not enter upon his duties until a few days after his appointment. Thus, Alan Stokes, appointed on 25 Sept., 1377, accounted from 29 Sept., and Richard Clifford, appointed on 28 Nov., se intromisit on 30 Nov., 1390. The appointment of Macclesfield, dated 26 Nov., 1397, definitely stated that he was to enter office on 2 Feb., 1398. Similarly, Edmund de la Beche, appointed on 25 July, 1344, accounted only from 18 Aug. When keepers died at their post, their executors were generally made responsible for the end of their account, and this vicarious responsibility adds another element of difficulty to the task of determining the exact dates of succession of keeper to keeper.

APPENDIX II.

TABLES OF WARDROBE FIGURES, 1224-1399.

THE following figures are published after much hesitation and largely in order to redeem a promise that I made in 1920 when I published my first two volumes. Readers of those volumes will remember that I was under no illusions about the value of such figures and about the futility of any attempt to base upon them generalisations as to the total revenue and expenditure of the various household offices or as to the gross revenue and expenses of the crown. Subsequent experience has more than confirmed my fears, and I now give my tables with grave doubts as to their fulfilling more than a humble useful service. But their comnilation has involved a great deal of labour and the results have helped to clear up my own mind. It is, however, clearly impossible to vouch for their accuracy without further investigation that would delay indefinitely the publication of a book already too long delayed. I have, however, limited myself to figures established in surviving wardrobe records. I showed, notably in Vol. ii, Section v, ways in which, at least from Edward I.'s reign, wardrobe receipts for years without surviving accounts might be calculated from the issue rolls or by the summation of partially surviving accounts. The few attempts I made in these directions 1 did not, however, convince me of their value, and I have excluded all such calculations from my tables.

The above prefatory note was written by Professor Tout in 1927 in order to register his impressions of these figures while they were still fresh in his mind. It is only necessary to add a few words in explanation of the arrangement of the tables.

The abbreviated headings of the tables stand for recepta de scaccario, recepta forinseca, hospicium and garderoba. The second of these did not actually come into regular use until the account of 8-11 Edward III., but the aliunde quam de scaccario of the earlier rolls is inconveniently long. The heading garderoba indicates that the original intention was to confine this column to the "necessary expenses" of the wardrobe itself, excluding the many miscellaneous objects of expenditure which follow this item on the rolls, but this plan was not long adhered to, and for the most part the figures in this column represent the total of the expense et liberate other than those of the household, together with which they make the summa expensarum. In accordance with this change of plan, the heading is under Edward II altered to forinseca. The figures in both these columns are often omitted, where, as is commonly the case, the details are not added up in the accounts, but they can usually be deduced from the other figures which are given.

It may be noted that the item prestita," advances," is hardly ever added to the sum of expenses in the rolls until the reign of Richard II, when it is included in a summa summarum. In the earlier tables, for the convenience of the reader. similar additions have been made.

Professor Tout had planned a further column, showing for comparison the issues of the exchequer when its accounting periods more or less synchronised with those of the wardrobe, but he had made no great number of entries of this kind, and it has been thought better to save space by putting them in footnotes.]

PREFATORY NOTE.

PROFESSOR TOUT originally entrusted the compilation of the Index to Dr. Broome, and she had prepared a large number of preliminary slips for persons and places, a smaller number for subjects, when his illness necessitated her giving up this part of the work. It was in these circumstances that I was asked at her suggestion to take over the Index -to finish what she had begun. For the arrangement of material and the general scheme, I must take full responsibility, though the original plans have been carefully followed wherever practicable, but experience of what was required made some modifications desirable as the work progressed. To make a perfect index is an impossible task, and the present attempt will not escape its share of criticism; but it may be pleaded that a strenuous effort has been made to draw up a logical scheme, to assist scholars and students to find the information they need, to make easier the task of co-ordinating the material on the various offices of state, and to render more readily available the encyclopædia of information on many sides of mediæval life which is so marked a feature of the book.

My work with the Index would have been considerably more difficult had it not been for the invaluable assistance that I have received from various persons, to whom it is pleasant to make acknowledgment for all that they have done to help me. To Dr. Broome I am specially grateful for her cordial co-operation and her unfailing kindness in elucidating the problems that I have taken to her. She has also read the proofs and helped with the identification of places. Miss Agnes Sandys generously contributed the subject slips of Vol. II., pp. 51-169, before my work had begun. Miss H. M. Cam made several useful suggestions. Mr. Charles Johnson and Mr. Hilary Jenkinson of the Public Record Office were most kind in giving me the benefit of their experience with regard to methods of arrangement and other knotty points. Certain

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sections have benefited by the review of them by Professor Johnstone and Mrs. Sharp, especially with regard to the Queens' and Black Prince's Households and Aquitaine. I want also to record my gratitude to Miss Edith Scroggs for the work which she did on the identification of English place names and to Miss Florence Kemp for her cheerful and accurate assistance in the duller and more mechanical side of the work. Finally, I am deeply in debt to Professor Tait and Mr. McKechnie for all that they have done at every stage of the work to render my task easier, and to Mrs. Tout for her courtesy throughout.

PREFATORY NOTE

SCHEME.

GENERAL REMARKS.

This scheme, on the whole, follows the accepted rules for indexing, but a certain amount of modification was necessary to meet the special requirements of the case. Unless care and forethought were employed there was grave danger that the subject entries would be gathered together in a few main headings which would become utterly unmanageable. Again, there is a vast mass of information scattered throughout these volumes which will be of value to scholars not specifically or primarily interested in the history of administration. The scheme as it stands aims at overcoming these difficulties in three ways. (1) In the main administrative headings a single system of rather elaborate sectional headings has been rigidly adhered to as far as the central administration was concerned, and when necessary for the lesser groups, such as local government. (2) Special attention has been given to biographical sections, and every reference, however seemingly unimportant, has been included. (3) For certain types of subjects other than those mentioned in (1) the system has been to collect all the references into groups with generic names: into this category fall Crops and Grains, Arms and Armour, Textiles, Receptacles, Occupations. To summarise, administrative subjects have to some extent been decentralised, but elsewhere the arrangement has been to group scattered entries under a general heading with cross-references from the small to the large general group. It may be added that cross-references have been extensively employed throughout in order to bring the relative sections into relation with each other and to facilitate reference.

I. GENERAL ADMINISTRATIVE HEADINGS. These are headings dealing with general and abstract sides of the subject.

They include such subjects as ADMINISTRATION, FINANCE, RECORDS. These should only be searched for generalisations, the parallel sections under each office will be found to contain the information for that office. Thus, under Administration will be found Dr. Tout's plans for "the present work," but the individual schemes for Chamber and Wardrobe are found under these headings respectively.

II. ADMINISTRATIVE SECTIONS.

1. KING'S ADMINISTRATION. The most important offices are the Chamber, Chancery, Council, Exchequer, Household, Parliament, Privy Seal Office, Wardrobe, Great Wardrobe, and Privy Wardrobe.

Certain subjects do not fall strictly under the above headings, and vet they are closely allied with them. Of such are the great officers of state, the Chamberlain, the Chancellor, the Treasurer and similar officials. Or again the various Seals are a case in point: here all references to the Great Seal, the Privy Seal and their fellows have been grouped under the main heading Seals, but the Privy Seal Office is under Privy Seal Office under P., so as to make it possible to arrange this office on parallel lines to the other great offices of state.

A word of explanation of the use of the word early as a chronological indication is advisable. When there was a very large block of entries in any section, it was broken up by inserting the reigns to which the references applied. "Early" means any date before the reign of the first king given in that entry. On the other hand, late or more usually later developments usually refers to any date after 1399.

The material has been grouped under the following headings:-

- (i) ADMINISTRATION. This is the general section and contains information and material which cannot be easily placed elsewhere.
- (ii) Connections and Comparisons. Connections are links with other offices of state and household; comparisons those with subordinate administrations or with the institutions of other countries.
- (iii) DEPARTMENTS. Here are grouped the actual departments of the particular office. For example, this section under Household brings together the Chamber, Council, Court, Domestic Offices, Hall, Marshalsea, Wardrobe and similar offices, but in the case of the more important there is only a cross-reference to the office itself (Wardrobe: see Wardrobe). In this way it is hoped to throw the various offshoots of the Household into relation with each other. This is a special case. since the household is the essence of the domestic administration, and in it are grouped certain really domestic offices (such as the kitchen) which do not appear elsewhere. But the same principle is followed in

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the case of other offices of state, though the word "Departments" does not always appear.

- (iv) Finances. Under this heading are three sub-sections, namely, Revenue, Expenditure, and Accounts, the whole section being designed to give information on the finances of each office. By collecting all these together from every administration, the reader will obtain all the information which Dr. Tout has accumulated on finance. It follows that when an account is discussed in the text from the point of view of audit it is properly included here, but when its bearings are diplomatic and record the particulars will be entered below under Records.
- (v) QUARTERS AND TRAVELS. This includes all information about the office being in and out of court, the *hospicium*, the dining and sleeping arrangements, itineraries and transport.
- (vi) Records. The arrangement of this section consists of a preliminary paragraph containing information on the records as a whole, with the various classes of records in alphabetical order below.
- (vii) Reforms form a group to themselves which includes the information about the various ordinances and statutes as they affect the particular office of state.
- (viii) Seals. Into this section have been assembled all the details of the seals which at any time were connected with that office.
- (ix) STAFF. It has not always been easy to distinguish between the staff responsible for the administration and the administration itself. These two sections and to a lesser extent some of the others are supplementary, so that it may be necessary to consult more than one to obtain all the information available.

Use of Italics.

The grouping of entries has been broken up as far as possible, so as to facilitate reference. It was found that there were groups of large sub-sections below those marked (i) to (ix) above. Italics have been employed to distinguish the titles of these. Thus, under Finance in any office are the italic headings Revenue, Expenditure, Accounts. Similarly, under Records and Staff italics are used. Here they may at first sight appear superfluous, but a reference to Letters or Writs under Records in any office, to Receiver of the Chamber, Baron of the Exchequer, or Keeper of the Wardrobe will reveal their purpose.

- 2. OTHER ADMINISTRATIONS.
- (1) QUEEN'S AND SUBORDINATE ROYAL ADMINISTRATIONS; and
- (2) Magnates' and Similar Administrations.

Under both (1) and (2) a double system of indexing was found necessary, i.e., under the name of the person concerned and under the appropriate administration. Thus the Queens' and Black Prince's households are under the name of the queen and under Edward of Woodstock with either a detailed entry or a cross-reference under Household, and similarly in other cases. The details of the arrangement under individuals is given below under Biography.

- (3) Local Administration. This is rather a miscellaneous group. In only a few cases will local administrative history be found here, since city and county chanceries and exchequers are not a common feature of the book, except in special cases, such as the palatinate administrations of Chester and Lancaster, and the administrations of Wales, Normandy, and Aquitaine. In other cases references should be made to the topographical section below.
- (4) OF OTHER COUNTRIES. Under this heading have been grouped all references to parallel offices and organisations abroad. Here, as elsewhere under Section 2, the double system has been followed, and the references are also found under Empire, Europe, France, and similar titles.

In entries under Section 2 a compromise has been effected between the scheme outlined in Section 1 and the normal arrangement in indexes, according to the needs of the individual case, the determining factor being in most cases the length of the entry and its contents.

III. BIOGRAPHY.

- 1. ROYAL FAMILY AND MAGNATES. Members of the royal family are indexed under their Christian names, with cross-references from the names of their birth-places and titles. This rule only applies to the immediate family of the king: in the case of other relations, such as the earls and dukes of Lancaster, the ordinary rule for magnates, namely, indexing under the surname, has been adopted. Thus, Henry of Bolingbroke, Henry of Grosmont and Henry of Lancaster are under Lancaster, the earls of Arundel under FitzAlan, as also for the sake of uniformity are Sir John Arundel and the cardinal.
- 2. ECCLESIASTICS are indexed under their surnames, but since the connection of certain bishoprics and other ecclesiastical preferents with the civil service is a matter of some importance, a list of the holders will be found under the ecclesiastical title.
- 3. CIVIL SERVANTS. Where there are two or more men of the same name, they have been distinguished as far as possible by the use of numerals, and every effort has been made to distinguish between them.

PREFATORY NOTE

William de Norwell may serve as an example of the nature of the problem. Several people have endeavoured to answer the question whether there were two men of this name or only one, and have failed to find a satisfactory solution. Where necessary, every entry has been re-examined after indexing, and an attempt made to ascertain Dr. Tout's final conclusions on the point.

The grouping together of the several offices held by one civil servant, or their separation, depended on the nature of the references in the text: thus in the case of certain holders of the chancellorship and treasurership, the references to both offices occurred on almost identically the same pages of the volume. Again, a minister who was always a bishop when he held office, would have both his office and ecclesiastical rank given each time. In such cases the two are grouped in one set of references to save space.

The order of the offices is sometimes alphabetical and sometimes in order of precedence: no definite rule has been adopted in these cases.

The use of de and of before a surname as far as possible follows the form used in the book.

IV. TOPOGRAPHY. Place names have been indexed even when they occurred only as part of the title of a person or the identification of the place from which a civil servant took his name. The general rule for identifications has been that (1) in the case of the British Isles and France the county or department has been given, but (2) since the places in other countries are nearly always well known, only the country has been given, unless there was special cause for making an exception. The addition of the abbreviations "co." for county, and "dep." for department, is not uniform, since variations were sometimes desirable for typographical and other reasons. Also absolute rigidity here and in the case of similar small points would have added considerably to the cost of production without adding to the value of the Index.

LOCAL ADMINISTRATION. Certain branches of local administration are more properly considered here, since they have no direct place in the sections dealing with the central administration, not being parallel developments to them. Such entries are to be found under the general headings Borough, City, County, Hundred, Sheriff, Town. Reference is also necessary to the individual places to ensure that all references have been found, for it was impossible to include every small reference over again under the general heading as well as under the place name, though all the more important are so grouped.

Also in some cases the entry occurs in yet a third place, as, for example, the writs for parliamentary expenses under parliament.

V. POLITICAL AND SOCIAL HISTORY. Neither of these have any obvious sections in the Index, but information about both can be easily obtained. The main new features of political history have been grouped under the events themselves, and also when necessary under the name of the king. The headings "Richard II." and to a lesser extent, "Edward II." and "Edward III." have assembled new facts and aspects of the subject. The Chapter Analyses in the Tables of Contents serves to supplement these sections, and accounts for the fact that greater emphasis has not been laid on this side of the Index. The Hundred Years War will be found as a section under France.

In the case of Social History, a great deal of valuable information may be gathered from the heading "Quarters and Travels" under each office of state, and from the collective headings such as Crops and Grains, Textiles, Arms and Armour, Animals, Bankers, Books, Occupations, Merchants, Clothing, and Furniture.

VI. ABBREVIATIONS.

CORRIGENDA. The form C. vi. with a page reference is used to attract the reader's attention to the fact that there is a correction on that subject at the given page of volume vi. Many of these corrections embody new discoveries and contributions made by other scholars, since the original volume was printed. They are thus important, and in a number of cases the references have been inserted in places where there is not an actual correction of the text but where the correction throws light on the subject of the entry. If the purpose of the reference is not obvious, an insertion has been made in the form (ref. ii. 235), i.e., reference vol. ii, page 235. This means that on the given page of vol. vi. will be found a correction of vol. ii. p. 235 which will throw light on the particular point where this entry occurs.
